Latest Developments

Palestinian activists said the Syrian government has not yet released a number of Palestinian detainees whose names appear on prisoner swap lists prepared following the Kafria-AlFoua deal.

The activists quoted the detainees' families as appealing to the concerned parties to reveal their relatives' fate.

AGPS has kept secret the names of dozens of detainees at the request of their families over security concerns.

At least 1,648 Palestinian refugees have been locked up in Syrian dungeons, according to AGPS figures.



Sometime earlier, AGPS released the names of 42 detainees included in the Kafria-AlFoua deal, struck between the Syrian government, Iran, and Tahrir AlSham Commission.

Meanwhile, Palestinian residents of Yarmouk Camp Mohamed Omar Shebli, born on March 18, 1981, Omar Samer Shebli, and Mohamed Omar Hanawi, born in 1985, have been held in Syrian government penitentiaries since May 8, 2013, when they were kidnapped at the government-run AlHusainiya checkpoint.

At least 213 Palestinians sheltered in Yarmouk Camp have been locked up in Syrian government prisons since the outburst of warfare.

In the meantime, militias from the so-called AlNour community have been stealing civilian homes in Yarmouk in the presence of government troops and their war partners.

Eye-witnesses said members of the Nour community, wearing special dresses, have been raking through evacuated homes and holding sway over brass pots and kitchen ware.



A video released by a resident shows a group of thieves leaving Yarmouk Camp while carrying equipment belonging to displaced families.

Reports of theft have emerged after Syrian government forces grabbed hold of the camp and reportedly burglarized civilian homes. Pro-government troops stole electric kit, furniture, and wares, among other equipment.

Six years have passed by since AlJa'ouna massacre, perpetrated on August 2, 2012, claimed the lives of over 20 Palestinians in Yarmouk Camp, south of Damascus, among them

children. Several other Palestinians were left wounded after two mortar shells slammed into the area prior to iftar (fast-breaking) time.

The list of casualties included the two children Anas Talouzi and Ibrahim Talouzi, along with Yahya Alyan, Fathi Alyan, Alaa Ghneim, Mohamed Anbatawi, aged 42, Rafe' AlRefa'i, Abdullah Saleh, aged 13, Mohamed Msheiness, Ahmed Areisha, Mohamed Rafe' Ali AlRefa'i, aged 27, Wael Adnan Atiyeh AlAhmed, Bahaa Ayoub, aged 21, Mahmoud Qanah, Alaa Mohamed Ghneim, Muhssin Walid Msheiness, Osama Akram Areisha, Yahya Ismail Alyan, Khairou Ahmed Hamida, and Emad Salah AlDin Qadah.

AGPS documented the death of 3,849 Palestinian refugees from Syria, including 478 women and girls, due to war-related incidents.
