## Latest Developments

AGPS has documented the death of 3,896 Palestinian refugees from Syria since 2011, as a result of war-related incidents.

AGPS found out that 1,198 refugees were killed under shelling; 1,064 were fatally gunned down, while 558 others were tortured to death in Syrian dungeons.

The list of casualties also included 310 Palestinians who were shot dead by snipers. The blockade imposed by Syria's pro-government forces on Palestinian refugee camps took away the lives of 205 refugees.



Scores of others died as a result of blasts, field executions, and onboard the Europe-bound migration boats.

Meanwhile, sources close to the Syrian government said a decision issued by Syria's Council of Ministers during its weekly session tasked local authorities in Damascus with rehabilitating infrastructure and destroyed facilities in Yarmouk Camp so as to pave the way for the safe return of displaced residents.

The Syrian government forces regained control over Yarmouk Camp and southern Damascus towns following a 33-day military operation launched on April 19. At least 33 civilians were killed and dozens more injured in the offensive. Over 80% of buildings in Yarmouk have gone either totally or partially destroyed in the warfare.



A number of activists and residents attempting to reach their homes in Yarmouk Camp have been denied access into the area by Syrian government troops deployed at the main entrances to the camp.

The government forces stipulated that an access permit be issued by the concerned branches set up in Street 30 and that residence documents be handed over to local authorities in order for civilians to be able to access their homes.

In the meantime, a UNRWA delegation, led by regional director Salim AlSheikh Kacem, popped in Daraa Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Syria, and gave pledges to work on rehabilitating vital facilities in the area.

The delegation toured residential alleyways and took note of the residents' demands. Students at alternative schools called on the

agency to enhance educational services and rehabilitate UNRWA schools and institutions.

Sometime earlier, Daraa governor said, following a field visit he paid to Daraa city on October 30, that the camp has been included in a rehabilitation plan drafted by the Syrian authorities to reconstruct re-captured zones.



In another development, Greece's Ministry of Immigration Policy said 3,386 Palestinians have applied for asylum in Greece since 2013 until 2018.

A statement attributed to the Greek Ministry of Immigration Policy said as many as 59,684 migrants from war-torn Syria have sought asylum in the country over the past five years.

Hundreds of Palestinian refugees continue to risk their lives onboard the Europe-bound "death boats", fleeing war-stricken zones.

According to AGPS data, 51 Palestinian refugees drowned at sea, trying to reach Europe.
