

Victims

Palestinian refugee Samer Salim Jarbou' was tortured to death in Syrian government jails, where he had been locked up for nearly five years. His death certificate was handed over to his family.

AGPS documented the death of 526 Palestinians under tortured in Syrian government penitentiaries.

Latest Developments

Head of AGPS Research Department, Ibrahim AlAli, warned of a serious disaster rocking Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Damascus, after the Syrian government forces regained control over the area in May.

AlAli said families displaced from Yarmouk have not yet returned to their homes, which have been left unreconstructed.





Speaking with Palestine Online newspaper, AlAli said Yarmouk residents cleared debris and trash in the camp in an attempt to return to their homes. However, the water and power crises, along with the poor infrastructure, have forced the residents out of the area once again.

AlAli added that no promises to reconstruct the camp have materialized on the ground and that debris has not yet been cleared.

The appeals of the residents and civil society institutions to reconstruct the camp have almost gone unheeded as no practical steps have been made by the Syrian government to work out the situation.

AGPS staff member further stated that scores of Yarmouk residents have gone displaced across and outside of the embattled Syrian territories.

The displaced residents of Yarmouk have had their hopes dashed by the destruction wrought on their homes and the increasing property-theft assaults carried out in the camp.

AlAli expressed concerns over the fate of dozens of displaced families, saying the damage inflicted on the camp only serves Israeli agendas seeking to wipe out Palestinians' presence in Syria.

Meanwhile, medics and paramedics in AlRukban Camp, on the Syrian-Jordanian borders, called on the international humanitarian institutions and concerned human rights bodies to urgently step in and safe dozens of children suffering from severe diarrhea and hepatitis A.



Medics appealed for an urgent entry of medicines to scores of children, women, and elderly persons diagnosed with life-threatening diseases.



Thousands of Palestinians and Syrians fled their homes south of Damascus due to the bloody hostilities rocking the area and the deadly onslaughts launched by the Syrian government forces and their Russian partners.

At the same time, thousands of Palestinians who have sought shelter in Lebanon have been subjected dire conditions as a result of their fragile legal status and their lack of access to the local labor market. Several refugees have faced blackmailing while others were forced to work at very low wages to feed their impoverished families.

Dozens of Palestinian youths in Lebanon dropped out of school after they failed to shell out enrollment fees.

Over 31,000 Palestinians from Syria have sought shelter in Lebanon, according to UNRWA figures.
