Victims

Palestinian refugee Mohamed Fayezy AlMar'i, from the pro-government Free Palestine Movement, died after a mine planted by ISIS in AlHajar AlAswad neighborhood, adjacent to Yarmouk Camp, south of Damascus, exploded.

Hundreds of Palestinian refugees died as they fought alongside the Syrian government forces against opposition outfits, ISIS, and AlNusra battalion in war-torn Syria.



Latest Developments

Palestinian refugee Zakiya Mustafa Amer, a resident of Handarat Camp in Syria, has been held in the Central Prison in Antakya, south of Turkey, on charges of illegally creeping into the Turkish-Syrian borders.

Reporting from Turkey, an AGPS correspondent said the Turkish authorities prevented Palestinian NGOs from visiting the detained lady on account that only members of her family are allowed to do so.



Palestinians fleeing war-torn Syria have been banned from entering the Turkish territories, forcing dozens to creep into the country via illegal routes.



Meanwhile, Palestinian refugees displaced from Yarmouk Camp and temporarily sheltered in Maarat AlNu'man, south of Idlib, north of Syria, rallied in solidarity with Palestinian families in Deir Ballout Camp, in Afrin's outskirts.

The demonstrators urged UNRWA and the Palestine Liberation Organization to take up their responsibilities regarding the calamitous situation endured by Palestinian families in Deir Ballout Camp.





They further urged the Turkish President and authorities to take serious steps in order to tone down the crises wrought on the displaced Palestinians in Syria-based refugee camps.

AGPS continues to sound the alarm over the abject living conditions undergone by the displaced Palestinian communities in over-crowded refugee camps set up north of Syria, deemed as the most tension-stricken region across the Syrian territories.

In the meantime, an exhibition for handicrafts was held by the Sanabel AlMustakbel scouts, in partnership with the Commission of Palestinians of Syria for Relief and Development, in Ata village, in Idlib's northern outskirts.

A member of the scout group said over 300 participants sheltered in refugee camps in Atma, in Idlib, took part in the event.

The Commission of Palestinians of Syria for Relief and Development continues to provide humanitarian assistance to displaced Palestinian refugees north of Syria.

Along the same line, at least 22 migrants, including children, have been killed in a truck accident Sunday, Turkey's official news agency said.

The Anadolu news agency said the migrants were traveling in a truck in the western province of Izmir that rolled over off a bridge. Video footage showed a destroyed truck, tipped upside down in a waterway with personal items scattered all around.



Thirteen people were injured in the crash and were being treated in nearby hospitals. Their nationalities were not given and authorities have launched an investigation.

Turkish media reported the driver was among the injured and said in his initial statement to police that a car had swerved in front of him.

Hundreds of thousands of migrants have set out to sea from Turkey's coasts in the last few years to try to reach neighboring Greece. A deal with the EU in 2016 to send those migrants back to Turkey significantly curbed the number of border crossings but many desperate migrants still attempt the life-threatening journey.

According to AGPS data, 51 Palestinians from Syria died onboard the "death boats" to Europe, fleeing war-torn Syria.
