Latest Developments

30 Palestinian refugees died of war-related incidents in Syria in June 2018. In 2017, 14 were pronounced dead during the same month.

In June 2018, AlAyedeen Camp in Hama topped the list with 24 victims, followed by Yarmouk Camp with three victims. Another refugee died in Daraa Camp.



The list of victims for June 2017 included 11 Palestinians in Daraa suburbs, one refugee in Damascus, and another in AlRiqa. One more Palestinian died in an unknown location.

Meanwhile, several Palestinian activists and refugees have been outraged by the decision of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) to arrange the return of Palestinian refugees in Gaza to Syria.

Activists dubbed the declared move a sign of the PLO's indifference as regards the displaced Palestinian families who fled from warragged Syria, saying those families were initially forced out of their



homes in Palestinian towns and villages by the Israeli occupation in 1948.

They called on the PLO to rally round the Palestinians from Syria in Gaza and to implement practical mechanisms so as to facilitate their return to their homes across the occupied Palestinian territories.

In the meantime, Palestinian refugees taking shelter in the Lebanese territories continue to sound distress signals over the security mayhem rocking refugee camps in Lebanon.

Scores of families who headed for Lebanon, fleeing deadly warfare in Syria, have been facing a dire situation in Lebanon-based refugee camps, particularly in Ein AlHilweh, as a result of the bloody clashes and uncontrolled circulation of weapons.



Dozens of families fled their camps; others have had their homes burned down; while several other families have had their property destroyed in Lebanon. The suspension of such vital services as health care and education has added bad to worse.

As a result, the number of Palestinians from Syria in Lebanon has remarkably shrunk back as life has gone unbearable in the territory.



Meanwhile, Palestinian refugee from Syria in Lebanon Ahmed Maghames reiterated his appeals to the human rights organizations, the Red Crescent, the Red Cross, the PLO, and the Palestinian factions in Lebanon to help him raise more funds so as to save his prematurely-born child.

The infant's father said medics at AlRai Hospital in Sidon, south of Lebanon, transferred him to a neonatal intensive care unit and tied him to a mechanical ventilator due to respiratory failure. The child is still in need of a special medical care to survive such a critical stage.

Sometime earlier, the father said he was in need of \$4,000 after UNRWA pledged to cover 90% of the fees of the neonatal incubator in which the infant has been kept. The Palestine embassy provided \$800 in aid. An anonymous donor also stepped in and provided the father with a sum of money.
