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“43 Palestinian Refugees were killed During June 2014”

- Warplanes hover too low over Al Aedein camp in Homs causing panic among people.
- Residents of Khan Al Sheih camp live stressful life crises.
- Jaramana camp residents complain of a lack of basic services and infrastructure.

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Victims

Action Group for Palestinians of Syria announced that the number of Palestinian refugee victims in Syria has reached 43 refugees, were killed during June 2014 due to events in Syria.

Where according to the group 15 Palestinian refugees were killed under torture in the prisons of the Syrian Regime, 16 refugees were killed by the shelling, two refugees were killed in mysterious circumstances, one refugees was killed after he was kidnapped, 4 refugees in the clashes, two refugees snipping, while one Palestinian refugee passed away due to the blockade and lack of medical care in the Yarmouk refugee camp.

Recent Updates

Warplanes hovered over Khan Al Sheih camp followed by a number of explosive barrels which targeted farms and areas surrounding it and that what caused a panic status among people.

Residents of the camp suffer from suffocating living crises because of depletion of most food, vegetables and flour, and an acute shortage of medicines, supplies and medical staff.



Residents of Al ae'dein Camp lived a state of tension yesterday as a result of warplanes hovering in low distance over the camp, coincided with voices of heavy explosions rocked parts of the camp, turned out to be caused by the bombing of nearby areas.

Otherwise, residents of Al Aedein camp in Homs facing a problem in the continuing power outages for long hours, especially during the day more than 16 hours.

On the other hand, Hittin compound witnessed a massive destruction of homes that were bombed, looting and theft, as the compound is completely clear of its residents and accessing to it is impossible. The suffering of Hittin compound began with the start of the events in the neighborhood of Barzeh, as the neighborhood is considered the first neighborhood that emerged in demonstrations in March 2011. The compound kept neutralization despite its geographic location which is near the events center, as its residents have been able to avoid engaging in the events circle in Syria. Despite the attempts by some to make armed formation of popular committees' security, the residents strongly refused to do so and deny arming anyone.

As at the end of 2012 and the beginning of 2013 it has become more dangerous in the compound, where it was subjected to shelling as well as sniping which was aimed at everything that moves. The compound was not a target itself but as a result of its location in the seam zone on the main road and next to the service compound (which is considered the center leadership of the Regular Army and air security north of Damascus) and communicates directly with the Byader neighborhood which is pro-regime and full of gunmen of the Popular Committees. While the suffering of Al Aedein camp in Hama concentrated in the economic side, due to the high cost of food supplies and living in general in addition to the crises in securing fuel, and the suffering of the people increase due to the spread of unemployment.

In a related context, the residents of Jaramana Camp complain about lack of basic services and infrastructure, such as sanitation, electricity network and water scarcity. According to a civilian ", the water cut off



from the camp for several days, and weeks in some cases, and it comes with low pressure and very limited hours, which cannot fill three tanks and houses empty reservoirs.

That what prompt residents to buy water from mobile tankers in high prices as a result of increasing the need for them in the past few months, adding to the financial burden on the people who suffer from poverty, and the spread of unemployment because of the continued conflict in Syria, "he said.

While the residents of Dara'a Camp lived a state of panic and fear because of the continued shelling on the camp, and the spread of snipers on the roofs of buildings, that overlook the lanes and streets of the camp, who snips every moving thing and that led to the death of many of the camp's residents. The residents also complain of the lack of food and flour and a severe shortage of medicines and medical staff and the continued cut of water, electricity and communication for long periods.
