

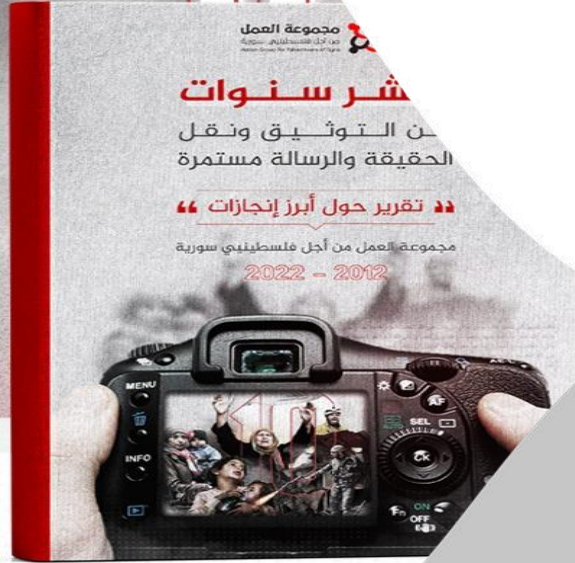

Latest Developments

AGPS issued a new report entitled “10 Years On...Mission Still Not Over”, which spotlights AGPS achievements since its founding in 2012.

The 37-page report corroborates AGPS role as a human rights watchdog monitoring the situation of Palestinian refugees in war-torn Syria. In seeking to fulfill this goal, AGPS team does its best to uphold the finest standards of historiographic ethics and maintain honesty in sourcing. To that very end, live snapshots, footages, and sworn affidavits are taken directly from the fighting scene across a myriad of flashpoints so as to authenticate AGPS role as a human rights overseer.

AGPS has released 3,821 daily reports documenting the situation of Palestinian refugees across war-torn Syria.

The reports are available on the group’s website both in English and Arabic: www.actionpal.org.uk.

Other materials, including videos, live snapshots, statistics on the number of casualties and detainees, news articles, and press releases also figure on the website.

AGPS material provides thorough data on the daily violations, death toll, and number of detainees in war-torn Syria. It also underscores the crises endured by the Palestinian community in refugee camps across and outside of the embattled Syrian territories.

The provided data is the by-product of joint efforts made by a team of field reporters, news correspondents, journalists, photographers, and researchers.

In another development, Palestinian-Syrian refugee Husam AlDeen Hasan, born in 1985, was arrested on Friday, January 06, by Turkish police in Esenyurt district, in the Turkish metropolitan city of Istanbul.

Husam failed to obtain the temporary protection card known as “kimlik” from Turkish authorities.



He has called for urgent action by the international humanitarian and human rights institutions in order to pressurize the Turkish authorities to work out his legal condition and grant him humanitarian asylum.

Nearly 2,400 Palestinian families from Syria have sought shelter in Turkey, including 1,200 families in Istanbul, where they have been facing an abject situation.

Khayra Ummah organization estimated that 400 Palestinian families from Syria without kimlik visas have been taking refuge in Turkey, including 300 families in Istanbul.

In the meantime, Bakr Adnan Khalayfa, born on October 27, 2009, has gone missing since January 10, after he left his family house in AlSabina Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq.

His family continues to appeal for information about his condition and whereabouts. His family's contact number is as follows:

Along similar lines, the Syrian National Army, which controls large parts of Aleppo's outskirts along with other areas north of Syria, released Palestinian refugee Mohamed Mahmoud Shreih on January 12.

Mohamed, a resident of AlNeirab refugee camp, in the northern Syrian province of Aleppo, was arrested in early 2022 as he attempted to illegally cross the borders with Turkey.

AGPS data indicates the presence of over 40 Palestinian refugees in detention centers run by the Syrian National Army.

AGPS has also documented the secret detention of 1,797 Palestinian refugees in state-run penal complexes across war-torn Syria, among them 110 women and girls.
