Victims

Palestinian refugee Fahd Salim AlSaadi, born in 1970, died as he fought alongside the Syrian government forces against ISIS militias in Hums desert.

Fahd's body was dispatched to Yarmouk Camp on Saturday. He was laid to rest in Yarmouk's New Cemetery.

AGPS documented the death of 1,076 Palestinian refugees as a result of gun shooting in Syria.



Latest Developments

A Palestinian refugee was arrested by Syrian government forces south of Syria over allegations of involvement in shooting attacks targeting government checkpoints.

The refugee was arrested by the air intelligence forces on the access road between Daraa and Da'el some three days ago.

Over 1,750 Palestinian refugees have been secretly detained in Syria's state-run prisons, according to AGPS database.

In another development, residents of Jaramana Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq, continue to rail against the mounds of trash accumulated across civilian neighborhoods and around the main access roads to the camp, resulting in bad smells and the spread of life-threatening diseases and rodents.

Recently, live photos from the camp showed trash mounds being piled up across residential alleyways.

Local activists and civilians lashed out at the concerned authorities for dragging their feet over the exacerbated situation in the area, calling them to urgently step in and work on removing trash without further delay.



Over recent years, residents of Jaramana Camp, located a few kilometers away from central Damascus, have set off alarm bells over the lack of basic services and dire socio-economic conditions rocking the area as a result of the steep rental fees, high rates of unemployment, and price hike.

The acute water crisis has made the situation far worse. Civilians say that as a result of the dearth in drinking water they have been

forced to purchase water from privately-owned tanks at extremely high prices.

Meanwhile, more than 20 Palestinian players showed up in a ceremony celebrating the end of the Olympic Sports Weeks in Jaramana Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq.

The event included competitions in chess, table tennis, and karate, among other sports activities.



Speakers at the event underscored the importance of sports in alleviating the fallouts of the agony wrought on the Palestinians and confirming Palestinians' unyielding commitment to their rights and identity.

In the meantime, AGPS calls on researchers, journalists, and activists to pop in its official website and scan its daily reports issued both in English and Arabic about the situation of Palestinian refugees in and from war-torn Syria.

Some 2,442 English reports have been released by AGPS on a daily basis since May 17, 2014.

AGPS saw the day in October 2012, following a workshop held to discuss the situation of Palestinian refugees in Syria.

AGPS material is purely fact-based and rooted in real data compiled by a team of professional journalists, on-the-spot reporters, news correspondents, veterans, and local activists.
