Netherlands Chasing Down Syria's Pro-Regime Militiamen

- 60 Food-Poisoning Cases Reported in AlNeirab Camp
- 80% of Palestinian of Syria Pronounced Dead in 2021 Civilians
- AGPS: UNRWA Decision Prevents Palestinians of Syria from Right to Live with Dignity



Latest Developments

The Dutch authorities issued a circular to all Syrians and Palestinians from Syria residing in the Netherlands to provide information about persons affiliated with Liwaa AlQuds militia, affiliated with the Syrian regime.

The move comes as part of a criminal investigation launched by Dutch police to chase down war criminals.

Dutch authorities called on people whose relatives or acquaintances were arrested in AlNeirab Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Aleppo, north of Syria, to reach out to them on the following email warcimes@politie.nl or through the number 7000-0800.

In another development, 60 people sustained food-borne intoxications on July 26 after they got food prepared at a restaurant.

The affected persons were transferred to specialized clinics in AlNeirab Camp. They are in a stable condition.

An AGPS news correspondent said the poisoning was caused by spoiled mayonnaise.

Meanwhile, AGPS data indicates that 85% of Palestinians of Syria pronounced dead in 2021 are civilians.

AGPS report documenting the situation of Palestinians of Syria in 2021 documented the death of 26 Palestinian refugees as a result of war-related incidents in Syria, 22 of them are civilians.

In the meantime, AGPS media chief, Fayez Abu Eid, slammed the recent decision by UNRWA not to register Palestinian refugees from Syria who enter Lebanon after August 01.

Abu Eid said the decision will have tragic consequences on vulnerable Palestinian refugees from Syria (PRS) who have already been enduring a dire humanitarian condition as a result of the protracted displacement and loss of livelihoods.

Citing UN data, AGPS media chief added that 87.3% of PRS live in poverty in the Lebanese territories; 95% are food insecure and 80% live on cash aid handed over by UNRWA.



Nearly 29,000 displaced Palestinian refugees from Syria are taking shelter in Lebanon.

Over 470,000 refugees are registered with UNRWA in Lebanon. About 45 per cent of them live in the country's 12 refugee camps. Conditions in the camps are dire and characterized by overcrowding, poor housing conditions, unemployment, poverty and lack of access to justice.

Palestinians in Lebanon do not enjoy several important rights; for example, they cannot work in many professions and cannot own property (real estate). Because they are not formally citizens of another state, Palestine refugees are unable to claim the same rights as other foreigners living and working in Lebanon.
